Robstown's Trevino finds his groove

Cotton Pickers hurler wins duel with Pirates' Martinez

ROBSTOWN — Robstown pitcher Carlos Trevino loved the chance to take on Sinton ace Jordan Martinez and the pressure that came with it.

In two previous outings against the Cotton Pickers, Martinez threw shutouts, which meant Trevino would also have to be on top of his game in the battle of District 31-4A heavyweights. Trevino thrived in the pressure and in the process provided the kind of start the Cotton Pickers (7-3, 2-1 in District 31-4A) needed in a 1-0 victory against the Pirates on Friday at Steve Castro Field.

Robstown pitchers struggled in their previous two outings on Monday and Tuesday against Ingleside and Orange Grove, respectively, allowing 11 runs in two games. Friday night, though, Trevino put together a performance that had

him and the team beaming.

"I love games like this," said Trevino, who won his first game of the season. "When I first started pitching, I was a closer and I wasn't a starter. Coming in with the pressure already on me I kind of developed the focus for it. This is a pressure game, and they are the best team and we come head to head with them in

Puerto Rico beats US team, moves into semis

SAN DIEGO - Puerto Rico is squeezing every bit of fun it can out of this World Baseball Classic.

Come Monday night, the party moves on to Dodger Stadium.

Yadier Molina and Puerto Rico advanced to the WBC semifinals after scoring four runs in the first inning and then holding on for a wild 6-5 win against the United States on Friday

When Edwin Diaz struck out Josh Harrison to end the game with Brandon Crawford standing on third base, players raced out of the Puerto Rico dugout to join the celebration on the infield. After a few minutes in the clubhouse, the team returned to the field waving small flags and ran over to celebrate with a large group of fans on the first-base side who were chanting, beating drums, rattling noisemakers and waving flags.

"We are happy for the job all the guys have done," Carlos Beltran said. "I think the boys have done a good job playing for their country. We're happy for our country and for our people. They are very proud of us and we hope to God we finish the mission."

Puerto Rico advanced to the championship round for the second straight WBC. It reached the championship game in 2013 before losing to the Dominican Republic.

By clinching Pool F with a day to go, Puerto Rico (2-0) will play the Netherlands on Monday night at Dodger Stadi-

The other semifinal spot from Pool F will go to the winner of Saturday night's

Longtime area official hangs up his whistle

Gaines ends career at state Class 3A boys final

When the final whistle blew at the Class 3A boys state basketball championship between Dallas Madison and Brock, it not only signified that the season was over, it was also the end of the line for one of the guys who blew the whistles.

On March 11, local referee Billy Gaines Jr. called the last game of a 32year officiating career. A career that included thousands of games and working for three officiating chapters across Tex-

"I had a good time," Gaines said. "It was extremely enjoyable and something

that I had a passion for. The longer you do it, the more the game slows down and you

start to appreciate the finer things.' Gaines, who began officiating as a student at the University of Texas, also called games in his hometown of San Antonio before he moved to Corpus Christi to work for the police department. During his 24 years as a referee in Corpus, Gaines called everything from pee-wee football to high school state finals, with a focus on high school football and basket-

"I called some memorable games, and also some games where it seemed the only fans in the stands were the wives the officials brought," Gaines said.

As a result of his positive critiques, Gaines made eight trips to the state basketball tournament and officiated five state finals in the Alamodome, the Astro-

dome, and the AT&T Center. In 2015, he was the head referee for the state's first Class 6A girls basketball championship game, and he also called a Class A football title game in 2010.

After moving to Corpus Christi, Gaines officiated Division II and Division III college basketball in Texas, and throughout his career he shared the floor and the field with future professionals such as NBA Champion Kendrick Perkins and NFL Pro Bowler Eric Metcalf.

Gaines also refereed semi-professionbasketball back when the Corpus Christi Sharks played at the Memorial Coliseum in the late 1990s.



NC State to introduce new coach Kevin Keatts on Sunday: North Carolina State will introduce new basketball coach Kevin Keatts on Sunday.

School officials say Keatts' introductory news conference will be held at 1 p.m. from Reynolds Coliseum. N.C. State hired Keatts from UNC Wilmington on Friday to replace fired Mark Gottfried.

The 44-year-old Keatts is a former assistant to Rick Pitino at Louisville and two-time Colonial Athletic Association coach of the year. He led UNC Wilmington to a 72-28 record and two NCAA Tournaments in three seasons in his first head coaching job.

Gottfried took the Wolfpack to the NCAA Tournament four times in his six years at the school but was fired in February during a 15-17 finish.

Illinois hires Oklahoma State's Underwood as new coach: Illinois has hired Oklahoma State's Brad Underwood as its new coach.

Underwood spent three successful seasons at Stephen F. Austin before signing on to coach Oklahoma State for 2016-17. The Cowboys got off to a rough start to Big 12 play before rallying with a 9-1 stretch that landed them an NCAA Tournament bid.

Oklahoma ed Michigan 92-91 on Friday, closing out Underwood's only season in Stillwater. Underwood replaces John Groce, who was let go earlier this month.

The Fighting Illini went 95-75 in five seasons under Groce but made just one NCAA tournament appearance.

Bucs sign veteran kicker Nick Folk: Veteran kicker Nick Folk has signed with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers.

The 10-year pro spent the past seven seasons with the New York Jets, ranking second in franchise history with 172 field goals. He was 27 of 31 last season while converting 24 of 26 extra point attempts.

With Tampa Bay, he'll compete for a job with Roberto Aguayo, a secondround draft pick a year ago who was inconsistent as a rookie when he was 22 of 31 on field goal attempts.

Jets sign former Cowboys CB Claiborne to 1-year deal: New York Jets have signed former Dallas Cowboys cornerback Morris Claiborne to a one-year

Claiborne, the No. 6 overall pick in the 2012 NFL draft, will help the Jets replace Darrelle Revis, who was released last week

The team announced the signing Saturday. Financial terms weren't immediately available, but multiple outlets reed that the deal is for \$5 million

cation, and it acted as a third career. Gaines is also a Senior Officer for the Corpus Christi Police Department and a Senior Master Sergeant in the United States Air Force Reserve.

Sometimes Gaines' three jobs would overlap, leading to long days and little sleep.

Once a month during football season, Gaines left home on Thursday night for his graveyard shift at the police department, arrive home to sleep early Friday morning, and wake up in the afternoon to prepare for his varsity football assignment. Then after the game he would drive to Lackland Air Force Base in San Antonio, where he had to report for his Unit Training Assembly at 5:30 a.m.

Marc Harrod, a fellow officer at the CCPD who was in a football officiating crew with Gaines for a decade, said pulling off double duty can be tough. Let alone triple duty.

'It is really difficult," Harrod said. "He did an amazing job. Graveyard shift on patrol, yet he was never late to a game. He was always there. He was don't know how he did it. He

made it look easy." Gaines made many friends while officiating, and the camaraderie he built with other referees is what Gaines will miss most about calling

games. "I will miss the officials I was working with," Gaines said. "When you work together for so long and start to get in sync, the game flows smoothly,

and that is an enjoyable feeling. Fellow official Jacoby Smith officiated with Gaines for the past eight years, including three straight trips to the state basketball tournament. He said Gaines was the perfect example for younger officials.

In more ways than one, Gaines has the perfect disposition for a career in the military, law enforcement, and even officiating.

"Billy was the ultimate professional," Smith said. "He was a leader, a mentor. Someone who was eager to teach. He just took command of the situation. That was the kind of figure he was and the kind of respect he garnered. He makes you a better official."

In all three of his jobs, Gaines naturally weaves himself into the fabric of his community, assisting people, and putting others before himself.

"He has a passion for helping and protecting others," his wife, Ruth Gaines, said. "He has a big heart. He wouldn't enjoy what he is doing if it doesn't involve helping someone."

Gaines' desire to spend more time with his family was the main reason he decided to retire from officiating.

During his 29 years in the Air Force Reserve, Gaines has been deployed to Alaska, Turkey, Japan, Iraq and other loboth domestic and bine his calls to duty with his graveyard shift at the police department and almost nightly game assignments, and there isn't much room for family time.

"It is tough (being a police and military wife)," Ruth Gaines said. "But thanks to our trust and faith in God he arrives home safely every time. I look forward to having him home more often."

Hanging up the whistle is the first retirement ceremony for Gaines, but his time as a police and military officer will soon be coming to an end, as well. As he approaches retirement with the Air Force and the CCPD, Gaines will surpass 90 years on the clock across his three professions, and his hard work hasn't gone unnoticed.

Gaines received the Meritorious Service Medal from the United States Armed Forces for his exemplary service in 2006 and 2011, and he was given the Lifesaving Ribbon from the Corpus Christi Police Department in 2014 for stopping an attempted suicide.

"Î'm very proud," his father, Billy Gaines Sr., said. "He does it all. You couldn't ask for a better son."
